Greetings to all the saints of God in FFUMC!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have helped in achieving sets of goals of ministry under my pastoral leadership for the last two years. You have been my true partners of ministry to build up this body of Christ together. Please forgive me for I cannot name you all in this limited space.

I was clearing up the computer in my office the other day and found the letter I wrote soon after I arrived here. It was the letter addressed

to the previous preschool director. It was quite a daunting task to dismiss a staff member as a new pastor. With many serious questions about the future of the preschool, appointing new directors was almost like an act from a blinded faith. Two years later the preschool has completely turned around and next year looks even more promising. I sincerely thank all three teachers for diligence and steadfastness and for rewarding my trust in you.

Many of you would not have noticed that the beautiful stained glass windows right above the choir loft illumine their beauty with all colors vibrantly standing out. The centerpiece of our sanctuary was dull when I saw it first. With my request, Richard Quackenbush labored for weeks to brighten them up with less costly light bulbs to shows the full magnificence. Thank you, Richard.

Thanks to you all for your participation and sharing your passion and vision for FFUMC. You have worked together with me to envision revitalizing the Church through "Envisioning Dinners" and identified characteristics of different generations and evangelism approaches accordingly. It was very heart-warming and encouraging to see your hearts were like-minded. The Revitalization plans were proud products of sharing visions, which I have strived to follow step by step.

Thanks to a generous contribution, we turned our fellowship hall into a multi-function and multi-media room. This enabled us to launch the new evangelism programs targeted for community movie nights. Update on proposed A/C



GOOD NEWS: THE NEW A/C IN THE SANCTUARY

As it has been over a century, FFUMC was, is, and will continue to be the place of worship for the saints of the Lord Jesus. The main purpose behind

installing the new A/C is to make our sanctuary a more comfortable place of worship. With this new addition, we aim to be more inviting and create more programs to bring people in from the community regardless of the weather conditions.

Benefits

It will help everyone including visitors to worship. Fanning will no longer need to be a part of worship activity. Also, the cool air will assist worship leaders such, choir members, musicians, liturgists, and preachers on the higher platform. The outside temperature will no longer be a deciding factor to host programs such as concerts and weddings during the summer.

Issues with the existing furnace

The furnace is reaching its life span after having worked over half a century. The current furnace has long been out of production and repairing it would not be possible at some point. Bids that the Trustees have received show that replacing it with a new HVAC using the existing ducts would cost over \$100,000.

The new A/C system comes with a built-in capability for heating. In case the current heating system fails, we will have an instant replacement.

Finances and Financial Impact

The Trustees have studied different options and pricings and decided to go with a split system, of which energy efficiency is very high. The cost of it is \$53,700. Enough funding for the project has come from various sources such as Christmas concerts, the Foundation, personal contributions, and the Conditional Donation from the Annual Conference. It means that for this superb addition to the life of FFUMC does not hamper with the on-going ministries and mission.

Operating Costs

If we decide not to use the old furnace, we could save \$2,300 for maintenance immediately, plus gas to heat the furnace and electricity which turn two massive fan motors. By using the new system, the actual increase for heating and cooling would be less than \$1000 a year including maintenance. Running the A/C during hot summer months would cost about \$1800.

Some said that FFUMC is the hottest church in town but may be the coolest one starting this summer.

Did you know that....?





With the abundance of World War II novels hitting the bookstores this year, Rosellen Gates could easily fit her experiences into a memoir. Instead, the 93-year-old Fullerton grandmother is taking her reminisces to Santa Rosa where she will share some of her stories in her new

home: a retirement community.

"At this age, I've learned you have to start downsizing early, maybe even two or three years ahead of time," says Rosellen, still packing a week before leaving the home she's loved for 65 years. "I'm about to wear down."

But she still has the mental strength to recall a life filled with adventure, music and first and foremost, a loving family.

Born in New Mexico, Rosellen's family moved to San Jose, California when she was in high school. She graduated from San Jose State College with a degree in piano and a minor in education. "I clearly recall when our football team traveled to play Honolulu right before Dec. 7, 1941. No one from the team died, but many signed up for service training."

After a year of teaching, the winsome brunette and her best friend decided in 1944 to join the Navy WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service). The division, established in 1942, consisted entirely of women eager to participate in the World War II effort to preserve freedom.

"We were sent to New York City for six weeks of intense training, and then for one month to the big Navy Exposition in Chicago where people could learn more about the Navy," Rosellen recalls. "I was assigned to a booth where I had to show-and-tell visitors in one sentence about the new radio models invented for use on our naval ships."

She suspects her booth was the most popular because sailors figured out she really didn't know about the terminology in the printed script and it was fun to tease her.

Then, it was on to Washington D.C. where she was trained in cryptanalysis in a secret communications department that worked in support of the national intelligence gathering effort.

When the war ended, Rosellen volunteered for an extra six months to help send Purple Heart Medals to families of men who were injured or killed on the battlefield or at sea.

While waiting to head home from Washington, D.C., two Navy pilots offered Rosellen and her friend flights in two-seater planes to circle above the nation's capitol.

"Little did we know, they would demonstrate all their high-flying tricks," she says with a chuckle. "And we later found out, they didn't strap us into our parachutes!"

Eventually, the women caught a free flight to San Francisco with "the first United Nations delegation on board."

Back in San Jose, Rosellen was reunited with her college sweetheart, Bob Gates, who had completed naval duty and was headed to Stanford University for his master's degree. The two married in 1947, and in 1950, Bob applied for a teaching job at a town of 11,000 "which we had never heard of."

The destination? Fullerton College in Fullerton, California where Bob would begin a 35-year career teaching physical science and working in administration. The couple purchased a home on Union Avenue overlooking orange groves and "their wonderful, heavenly scent." They also watched a tract of homes spring on the next street, and decided to buy a three-bedroom, two-bath abode for \$25,500.

The neighborhood was called Faculty Row, with many of the residences purchased by Fullerton College instructors and administrators. And many of the residents were members of the Fullerton Methodist Church where the Gateses became very active

"Right away, we found a family in the church," says Rosellen, who through the years, taught Sunday school and for 40 years sang in the adult choir. In 1975, she persuaded 18 church members to help form a recorder group. Word spread, and the first night 50 people arrived to learn to play classical music.

Connie Pilling awarded 50 year pin for Girl Guide and Girl Scout!

A 50 year tenure pin will be presented to Connie at the Disneyland Hotel on June 7, 2015.

Connie began her tenure with Brownies in 1944; then graduated to Girl Guide, first as member, then as a Girl Guide Leader - Lieutenant, then Captain. She completed her service in Leeds, England in 1962. She had built the Girl Guide company from 23 to 65 members. This same company formed a Guard of Honor at her wedding.

She came to the U.S.A. in 1962 and resided in Riverside, CA for three years. Connie continued to immerse herself in the Scout programs. She was a camp director in 1964 for the summer with the San Gorgonia GS Council at an established site near Jenks Lake. There were 200 girls who came every two weeks for a six week stay. Connie also started a troop at Cresthaven School for mentally handicapped children while being a Cadette Troop Leader. While running both troops, she instituted a once a month day camp with both troops, to the benefit of all the girls.

Connie returned to England for the years 1966-67 as a Girl Guide Badge Trainer and Tester.

In 1978, she was appointed as a Brownie Troop Aid. In 1980 Connie led a Junior Girl Scout Troop. This was in Fullerton, CA where she has since resided.

In 1990 to 2015 Connie became a member of "OWLS" along with being a speaker. She would give slide presentations to Brownie, Junior and Cadette Troops in Fullerton and the surrounding cities on "British Girl Guiding". During this time Connie has participated in all the "OWLS" functions and activities.


